OUR AIR AMBULANCE



London's Air Ambulance service has been saving lives for 26 years. Since its inception in 1989, its highly trained paramedics have treated over 31,000 seriously injured people, enabling most to return successfully to their day-to-day lives. Based at Northolt Airport, London's Air Ambulance has the impressive ability to reach and treat a casualty anywhere in London within 12 minutes. The service is afforded unique privileges in the capital; it takes priority over all other air traffic when on an emergency call and its helicopter pilots have the right to land anywhere they deem safe. All they require is a space the size of a tennis court – as near to the emergency scene as possible.

Obviously, flying in London air space has its severe challenges so the choice of aircraft is critical. After extensive research the MD902 Explorer Twin Engine Helicopter was selected for its safety features which importantly include no tail rotor, essential in the congested London environment. It is specially adapted to enable patients to be treated in flight, even to the level of intensive care if needed. The helicopter does not always transfer the patient directly to hospital after emergency treatment; sometimes it is necessary to continue the journey by London Ambulance, accompanied by the helicopter trauma team.

After dusk or in adverse weather conditions the helicopter is replaced by cars to ensure 24 hour coverage for London. The Air Ambulance Service now also has two new, specially adapted, rapid response cars in the same red livery as the aircraft, and fitted with blue lights. They are operated by the same team who performs the identical life-saving procedures in the helicopter.

Before the introduction of the London Air Ambulance, seriously injured patients were dying

needlessly because of the delay in receiving prompt and appropriate medical care. Motorcyclist enthusiast Dr Gareth Davies recalls the exact moment when he recognised the need for a doctor-led emergency helicopter service. "I was watching one of the Isle of Man TT races and I saw a motorcyclist crash into a bridge and was critically injured. The helicopter landed near the crash and the doctor on board immediately began life-saving medical care. The sad thing was that it was only the race riders that would receive that service, not the general public. It seemed obvious to me that the public deserved the same care whatever caused their injury."

One person who did receive the same care was 35-year-old teacher Angela Barlow, who was run over by a hit-and-run car when she was 11 years old. The collision crushed her head – a life-threatening injury - and broke her leg. The London Air Ambulance team rushed to the scene and, while administering emergency treatment, took Angela to the Royal London Hospital in three minutes flight time. Angela was very seriously injured and was expected to be left paralysed but thankfully she made a miraculous recovery. Angela's family will always be grateful to this charity. Yes charity, like many other life-saving charities in this country. And they urgently need our support to purchase a second helicopter (www.yourhelicopter.london) and recruit additional pilots and crew to extend their daylight flying hours during the summer months. If you'd like to support this great cause you may be interested in their lottery scheme. LETTER FROM FELICITY

Dear Friends,



Whilst travelling home from St Pancras to Ickenham recently I was struck by the constant warning to "mind the gap". I spent the whole journey pondering how easy it is to fall down the cracks of society and find oneself isolated and alone.

I suppose the obvious example might be loss of a job. It's not just about having enough money to pay the mortgage and to buy food and other necessities; although that in itself opens a yawning gap between those who have work and those

who do not. It's also about having an identity, a reason to get out of bed in the morning. But most of all it's about the value of life: it's about having a sense of worth. Many of those who lose a job and can't

find another start to lose their connection with friends and neighbours, feeling themselves isolated in an 'in between' place – they are in the gap with no easy way out.

I went on to think about the elderly, those who are retired and no longer work. Many of them are still busy: out and about with hobbies and sports, and doing all sorts of voluntary work. But there are a good number of elderly folk who, for a variety of reasons, are no longer active. Unable to get out and socialise, some of the elderly (especially those without family support) don't speak to a living soul from one day to the next – they have fallen down a gap from which they can't extract themselves.

Sometimes we *can* 'mind the gap' – but sometimes, as in the two examples I pondered on the train, we cannot. All faith groups have a support structure, and Christianity is no exception. St Giles', like the URC, is a place where we support and encourage one another in all the ups and downs of our daily lives. As followers of Christ we believe ourselves to be brothers and sisters with ties as strong as any family blood relationship. We are bound together by our belief in Jesus, who shed His blood so that we could have a relationship with God (Father, Son and Spirit).

Yet we are also mindful of those outside our walls who may have fallen down 'the gap'. We don't always get it right, but as Christians we try to stand in the gap between those who have and those who have not; those who for whatever reason live in isolation, anxiety or fear and those who have a network to hold and support them.

HYMNS – OLD AND NEW

We're without a minister at the URC, and have been for some time. One of the benefits, however, is that we have a variety of visiting preachers; we have some extremely able members of our own congregation and a pool of men and women from other churches that we invite to lead our worship. They can come from different denominations, and bring a refreshing slant on things for us week by week.



We find we have a good mix of old and new hymns, with some very popular ones being chosen quite regularly; "To God be the Glory" is one of them. I feel it's a favourite with our preachers because the hymn is all about the Lord, and not us. Looking at the source of the hymn, as I often do, I've noticed that the words of it were written by Fanny Crosby. I decided to find out more about her:

She was born in a village in New York State in 1820, and died in 1915. She was blind, probably from birth, but wrote over 8,000 hymns and gospel songs. She apparently didn't regret being blind, and was quoted as saying, "When I get to heaven, the first face that shall ever gladden my sight will be that of my Savior."

She had a very fine memory, which she attributed to her blindness; by age 15 she had memorised the four gospels, the Pentateuch, the Book of Proverbs, the Song of Solomon, and many of the Psalms! Her poems and hymns were composed entirely in her mind and she worked on as many as twelve hymns at once before dictating them to an amanuensis. Her hymns have been criticised as mawkishly sentimental, but many are still sung regularly today.

Despite her fame as a writer and a public speaker, she wanted to be seen primarily as a city mission worker, ministering to immigrants and the urban poor. Throughout her life, she had "a horror of wealth", often refused payment, and gave away what little she did accept almost as soon as she got it.

When she died, at her request, her family erected a very small tombstone, bearing the words: "Aunt Fanny: She hath done what she could; Fanny J. Crosby". Despite her specific instructions not to have a marble monument, a large memorial stone, which "dwarfed the original gravestone" was

subsequently erected by her "friends to whom her life was an inspiration". It contained the first stanza of "Blessed Assurance".

Now that's an idea for a Favourite Hymns service...

CIRCLING THE CITY FOR CHRISTIAN AID

On Sunday 17th May, Ickenham church members, family and friends, took part in the Circle the City Walk for Christian Aid, visiting 16 of the many churches in the City of London.

Having registered at St Mary-Le-Bow, famous for its bells, we made our way to St Paul's Cathedral. Next stop was St Bride's, the printers' church, just off Fleet Street, with its "Wedding Cake" spire, where the children received fancy swan hats and butterfly wings from balloon artists (pictured). Then we visited Christchurch Greyfriars, with its beautiful garden encompassed by the walls and west tower, for prayer and reflection time.

Onwards to St Giles Cripplegate, Barbican and St Lawrence Jewry, the main place of worship for the Corporation of London. We visited St Margaret Lothbury next, followed by the Dutch Church. Then we headed to St Botolph without Bishopsgate, which is the only church to survive the Great Fire of London, but which later fell into



disrepair and was demolished and rebuilt in 1725. Its churchyard memorial to the First World War dates from 1916 and a garden memorial commemorates John Cornwell who was awarded the Victoria Cross at just 16 years old. The 'final lap' took in visits to Bevis Marks Synagogue, which is London's oldest synagogue founded in 1701, St Botolph without Aldgate, St Michaels Cornhill (another prayer point on the route), St Mary Woolnoth, where John Newton (of 'Amazing Grace' fame) preached, St Olave's (burial place of Samuel Pepys), and finally All Hallows by the Tower, founded in 675. The Knights Templars held their trials there and Samuel Pepys watched the Great Fire of London from its tower - well worth a separate visit in the future.

A tired, happy band of travellers finally collapsed into Zizzi's restaurant for a well-earned rest and refreshment. We had all experienced a close brush with history and the peace and tranquillity of the churches and met many fellow wanderers as we went from church to church.
